Theme of the Month-Aaranya

We move houses every 7 to 10 years. In the wild, animals shift homes several times a day—a tree to rest, a stream to drink, a clearing to hunt. For them, the forest isn't just a place. It's everything. We grab groceries wrapped in plastic. In many tribal regions, people gather dinner straight from the forest—roots, fruits, leaves, honey. It's not convenience food, it's survival. We scroll for skincare. Forests provide oils, herbs, and resins that communities have used for generations—long before brand names and price tags. While we build lives with concrete and code, millions still build theirs around forests. Forests offer not just food and nutrition, but income, medicine, shelter, and identity. In Sanskrit, "aranya" means forest or wilderness—a word that feels ancient, but whose relevance is more urgent than ever. Because even today, forests are key to food security, nutrition, and livelihoods. And yet, they're disappearing. Saving forests isn't just about trees—it's about protecting the roots of life itself.

Forests provide food in ways we often overlook. In many tribal and forest-dwelling communities, wild plants like mushrooms, leafy greens, and fruits are part of everyday meals. These aren't backup options—they're essentials, especially during crop shortages or droughts. Forest foods are free, accessible, and often available when farm-grown food isn't. They help fill the gap during what's called the "lean season," when stored grains run out and the next harvest hasn't yet arrived. Many forest foods are naturally packed with nutrients. Leaves like moringa, fruits like jamun and amla, or seeds like tamarind offer vitamins and minerals that help prevent common health issues like anemia or vitamin deficiencies. In areas where access to healthcare is limited, these foods quietly do the work of expensive supplements. Traditional knowledge about which plants heal and which nourish is passed down through generations—and it works.

When forests are cleared for roads, farms, or mining, it's not just trees that are lost. The systems that provide food, nutrients, and jobs begin to fall apart. Deforestation affects the rainfall that farmers rely on. It reduces access to wild foods. It pushes out people who've depended on forests for centuries. Slowly, food security weakens. So does nutrition. So do rural economies. Forests have always done the work—feeding people, healing bodies, supporting lives—without asking for credit. They don't come with ads, slogans, or a marketing team. But maybe it's time we paid more attention. Because protecting forests isn't just about saving animals or hugging trees (though, no shame if you do). It's about keeping food on plates, nutrients in diets, and incomes flowing for millions. If we treat forests as allies instead of afterthoughts, they'll continue doing what they've always done—quietly, steadily, and without a fuss. And in a world that's only getting louder, that kind of quiet strength might be exactly what we need.

Sugar Charts

Sugar can be harmful to our body if intake is increased it causes diabetes and heart diseases. Sugar is the main type of carbohydrates, crucial for providing energy to the body cells. Women should take no more than 6 teaspoons (25 grams or 100 calories), 9 teaspoons (36 grams or 150 calories) for men and for children, sugar intake is less than 25 grams (6 teaspoons) above the age of 2. Sugar Charts are an awesome way to prevent you from eating too much sugar. Sugar charts were added by Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) on May 17th 2025 to compulsorily install it by July 15th 2025. They should include:-

- · Recommend daily sugar intake
- · Sugar content in common food
- · Health risks associated with high sugar consumption
- · Healthier dietary alternative

Classes who have done sugar charts also have nice borders, main reasons, pictures, creativity and colourfulness. It was good for the CBSE Board to add the sugar charts to every school as it helps spread the awareness of how much damage sugar can do to our body. There are 2 main types of sugars - Good Sugar and Bad Sugar. Good sugar can be found in unprocessed foods like fruits, vegetables, dairy products and jaggery. Bad sugar is added to foods and drinks during process, preparation, or before consumption. Bad sugar is in sweets like chocolate, candy canes etc. Did you know - Packaged juice consists of 20 -26 grams of sugar per 240 ml and Honey has 17 -18 grams of sugar per 21 grams.
