Our school celebrated Math Week with great enthusiasm on 19th and 20th January for students of Grades 1 to 4, reinforcing our commitment to joyful, meaningful, and activity-based learning in mathematics.

Students participated in a wide range of thoughtfully designed activities that helped them explore both mathematical concepts and their real-life applications. They learned about fractions, explored various 2D and 3D shapes, and constructed Magic Squares and Ramanujan Squares, discovering fascinating number patterns and logical relationships. They also explored before and after numbers, ordinal numbers, and number patterns, strengthening their understanding of sequences and order. In addition, students appreciated the importance of the hexagon as nature's most efficient shape and understood the concepts of reflection and symmetry through hands-on creative tasks.

To connect mathematics with everyday life, students decoded India's PIN codes, studied vehicle registration numbers, and even interpreted intercom numbers used in apartment buildings, gaining an understanding of how numbers help organise and simplify daily living. Learners also created their own bank account numbers and explored how flight numbers are assigned, culminating in the design of personalised flight tickets.

Creativity found a beautiful expression through Mandala Art, where students blended geometry with artistic patterns.

Overall, Math Week proved to be an enriching and inspiring experience, nurturing logical thinking, creativity, and a deeper appreciation of mathematics as an integral part of everyday life.




